Prayer for October

In the name of your Son who gave himself for us, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Collect

Blessed Lord, who caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning: help us so to hear them, to read, mark, learn and inwardly digest them that, through patience, and the comfort of your holy word, we may embrace and for ever hold fast the hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our Saviour Jesus Christ, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Isaiah 45.22-end

Turn to me and be saved, all the ends of the earth! For I am God, and there is no other. By myself I have sworn, from my mouth has gone forth in righteousness a word that shall not return: 'To me every knee shall bow, every tongue shall swear.' Only in the Lord, it shall be said of me, are righteousness and strength; all who were incensed against him shall come to him and be ashamed. In the Lord all the offspring of Israel shall triumph and glory.

Second Reading Romans 15.1-6

We who are strong ought to put up with the failings of the weak, and not to please ourselves. Each of us must please our neighbour for the good purpose of building up the neighbour. For Christ did not please himself; but, as it is written, 'The insults of those who insult you have fallen on me.' For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we might have hope. May the God of steadfastness and encouragement grant you to live in harmony with one another, in accordance with Christ Jesus, so that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel Reading Luke 4.16-24

When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour.' And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.' All spoke well of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They said, 'Is not this Joseph's son?' He said to them, 'Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, "Doctor, cure yourself!" And you will say, "Do here also in your home town the things that we have heard you did at Capernaum." 'And he said, 'Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's home town.

Sermon preached by The Revd James Marston at Aldeburgh Parish Church, 16th October

And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night?

According to one biblical commentator: "The parable of the widow's persistence is introduced as a parable about prayer and not losing heart, then moves into a story about justice, and ends with a question about faith."

According to another: "The parable assumes that God's people are like litigants in a lawsuit waiting for God's verdict." This theologian goes on to provide some detail of the administration of justice in first century Palestine. A rather dry subject which, frankly, bored me and I shan't inflict on you this morning.

Suffice to say that the parable of the persistent widow is, it seems to me, a reminder less of vindication through faith but more about the power and necessity of prayer.

In our service this morning we pray together the lord's prayer- taught to us by Jesus himself when asked by his disciples how to pray.

And prayer, in whichever form it takes, is at the root of all our relationships with God.

It is through prayer we appeal to almighty God, listen to God, cry out to God, thank God and ultimately, through this mysterious medium, we have our faith in God deepened and our souls are saved.

What is prayer is a harder question to answer.

Sometimes prayer comes easily, other times not so easily. Sometimes I think it is less about us and what we do and more about the Holy Spirit working through us as we pray.

Prayer is liturgical it is about words; it is also about silence and reflection. Pray is about gratitude but also asking for help and guidance.

Prayer is something we do together and something we do alone. Prayer is communal and individual – often both at the same time.

Prayer is often the Christian response to difficult or unpleasant situations that seem to require more than sitting in silence or saying something together. Yet joining the river of prayer is action, and prayer the fitting response all Christians should turn to.

Prayer isn't exclusive to the church setting, but it is often easier to pray in a certain prayerful place.

Silent prayer is probably about communing with God, but often the shopping list, or other anxieties fill our minds instead of the holy thoughts we think we ought to be engaged with.

People often ask me to keep them in their prayers – it is something we can do for others – but also it is something we can do for ourselves. We pray to Jesus, to the Holy Spirit and to God the father. We ask the saints to pray for us too.

Prayer is something of a mystery and a paradox.

Perhaps one of things it does do is calm us down, a moment of prayer can often still us and change our perspective to beyond that of our selfish concerns.

As one commentator puts it "Perhaps the parable suggests that a sign of faith will be a willingness to persist in prayer, as we see in this widow who persists against all odds in her fight for justice against the powerful judge. Another sign (of faith) may be in what we pray for: daily bread, the Holy Spirit, the kingdom, justice — or something altogether different." Putting prayer at the root of our faith and at the root of our lives changes us and transforms us as we deepen our relationship with God. Indeed, we can often sense if someone is prayerful because of an inner calmness they exhibit or show us. Indeed, we often know who those people are in our own church communities.

My challenge to you this week – and I never like to leave you without one – is to remember prayer in your own lives. As the 17th century clergyman Jeremy Taylor said: "Teach us to pray often, that we may pray oftener." Dig prayer into your routine. Pray in those moments of difficulty and pray in those moments when things are going well.

Pray in all we do. Pray in whatever form works for you, after all God has given us a few ways of prayer in which to maintain and develop a relationship with him.

In the final analysis everything in life is prayer and everything about us is an offering to God.

Let us bow our heads and pray together for the spirit of prayer: Heavenly father, grant in us a prayerful souls. Give us your grace as we deepen our faith. Strengthen us in our understanding, guide us on our journey of faith, Teach us to love you. Be with us in all we do and all that we are. "Teach us to pray often, that we may pray oftener." We ask this in the name of your son our Lord, Jesus Christ. Amen

God of all grace, your Son Jesus Christ fed the hungry with the bread of his life and the word of his kingdom: renew your people with your heavenly grace, and in all our weakness sustain us by your true and living bread; who is alive and reigns, now and for ever.
