Collect

Heavenly Father, whose blessed Son was revealed to destroy the works of the devil and to make us the children of God and heirs of eternal life: grant that we, having this hope, may purify ourselves even as he is pure; that when he shall appear in power and great glory we may be made like him in his eternal and glorious kingdom; where he is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Malachi 4.1-2a

See, the day is coming, burning like an oven, when all the arrogant and all evildoers will be stubble; the day that comes shall burn them up, says the Lord of hosts, so that it will leave them neither root nor branch. But for you who revere my name the sun of righteousness shall rise, with healing in its wings. You shall go out leaping like calves from the stall.

Second Reading 2 Thessalonians 3.6-13

Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labour we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.

Gospel Reading Luke 21.5-19

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, he said, 'As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down.' They asked him, 'Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?' And he said, 'Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and, "The time is near!" Do not go after them. When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately.¹⁰Then he said to them, 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven. 'But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defence in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls.

Jesus and the Children, from the Lion Storytelling Bible

"I can't see!" called a blind woman. "Can you help me see, Jesus?"

"I can't see!" said a little girl to her mother, "There are too many people in the way."

There are whole books dedicated to the importance of grammar – especially the positioning of a comma. The difference between 'Let's eat, Grandma!', and 'Let's eat Grandma!'' could be very important!

It strikes me that in the story we have just heard, there are two different reasons the blind woman and the little girl said, "I can't see". The blind woman added "Can you help me see, Jesus?", and although she didn't, the little girl could easily have added, "Can you help me see Jesus?". Like inviting your grandparent for a shared meal, or dancing with the possibility of cannibalism, there is an important distinction between these two exclamations.

Can you help me see, Jesus? Can you help me see Jesus?

Can you help me see Jesus? Jesus is there, I just can't physically see him. I'm sure we can all remember at some point in our lives just not being tall enough. Having to stand on tip toe, jump a little, jostle, really strain every sinew in order to see something of someone. Well, in our story today, this is what the little girl was feeling – there were too many people between her, and Jesus and she just couldn't see him. She knew he was there, and she was desperate to see him, but other people got in the way. I wonder why it was so important to her that she could physically see him?

Can you help me see, Jesus? Was a direct request from the blind woman, to Jesus, who was right in front of her. She wanted Jesus to help her to see again. This time to heal a physical disability, but what else can Jesus help us to see? I wonder what important things we could all ask Jesus to help us to see?

And what happened? Well, Jesus healed the blind woman. He gave her sight again. She could physically see what was directly in front of her. Jesus the man. I wonder whether she could also then see Jesus the Messiah? Jesus performing miracles because he is the Son of God? Did she gain any deeper insights as the result of her physical sight being restored?

And as for the little girl? Well, Jesus told people to bring the children to him. That nobody should be a barrier to the children. That they are important, and we should all try to be more like child. The little girl not being able to see Jesus was about barriers being put in her way to physically keep her away from him. I wonder what other barriers stop us from seeing, or being with Jesus?

Like a child, we are called to be curious. Like a child, we are called to ask questions. Like a child, we are called to want to be close to Jesus. We are called to open our eyes and to see. People often talk about the simplicity of a child's faith. I would argue that that is because they have less barriers in the way of them seeing Jesus. Physical or otherwise.

And when, like the blind woman, Jesus is directly in front of us, we need to keep asking those questions, keeping yearning for more sight, for more understanding, for Jesus to help us to see. These two questions will mean different things to each one of us here -1 wonder what they mean to you?

Can you help me see Jesus? Can you help me see, Jesus?

Greetings from us all here at the Cathedral. Advent is soon to be upon us, as we prepare hearts and minds for the celebration of the birth of the Christ-child at Christmas. Parishes, Benefices and Deaneries are, as each year, warmly invited to the Cathedral again for the traditional annual Candlelit Advent Procession with Bishop Martin, and led by our cathedral choristers: <u>5.00pm on Sunday</u>, <u>27 November</u>. This 'darkness to light' service uses readings, music and congregational carols, moving around the liturgical space of the cathedral, to mark the start of the season of expectation and preparation for the *adventus* of Christ in his incarnation and to his final advent at the end of time.
