Collect

Eternal God, who made this most holy night to shine with the brightness of your one true light: bring us, who have known the revelation of that light on earth, to see the radiance of your heavenly glory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Isaiah 9.2-7

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined. You have multiplied the nation, you have increased its joy; they rejoice before you as with joy at the harvest, as people exult when dividing plunder. For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian. For all the boots of the tramping warriors and all the garments rolled in blood shall be burned as fuel for the fire. For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of

Peace. His authority shall grow continually, and there shall be endless peace for the throne of David and his kingdom. He will establish and uphold it with justice and with righteousness from this time onwards and for evermore. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this.

Second Reading Titus 2.11-14

For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all, training us to renounce impiety and worldly passions, and in the present age to live lives that are self-controlled, upright, and godly, while we wait for the blessed hope and the manifestation of the glory of our great God and Saviour, Jesus Christ. He it is who gave himself for us that he might redeem us from all iniquity and purify for himself a people of his own who are zealous for good deeds.

Gospel Reading Luke 2.1-14 [15-20]

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn. In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favours!'[When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem

and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.' So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.]

Or if no Midnight Service

John 1.1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

Sermon preached by The Very Rev'd Christopher Lewis at Knodishall, on the Fourth Sunday of Advent

Many of us have been taught that God is powerful and great....although, not like a dictator, but more like a benevolent monarch, presiding over the world as it were from the clouds on high, like a William Blake picture. God is seen as having a kingdom, in a bit of which we live: thy kingdom come, thy will be done. If that is so, it is fair to ask (and 2022 is a pretty good year for asking) 'Why is the kingdom – the world – in such a mess?' Why does God allow Covid; why have we got through quite so many prime ministers; why allow the Ukraine war to happen? Just as we often reply to people who moan about things 'Well, why don't you do something about it?' we might ask the same thing of God, who cannot be pleased about the way the world is. 'Oh God, why can't you sort it out?' Indeed, while God is at it, stopping Russians sending missiles to destroy power stations and people, couldn't he clear up a few more personal things: fix John's marriage, find food for the poor?

It is a tempting view. Wouldn't it make the world a better place? If God is so wonderful, why does he sit 'enthroned in heavenly splendour' while not, it seems, doing much?

Now, with some questions about God, the answer is full of mystery, but with this question, I believe the answer is pretty clear. And it is that God has chosen to limit the way he works in the world, making a clear rule for himself expressed in the life and the death of Jesus Christ. He works in an unexpected and quiet way by inviting people to follow the path of his Son Jesus; and He promises to be alongside everyone as they respond, alongside in the form of the Holy Spirit, giving life and strength. From the point of view of today's Gospel, he works through the response of people like Mary and Joseph.

But why does he appear to have made this rule for himself and for us? It must be because we are fully human and genuinely free. If he were to squash Putin's plans, he should also do a few other things: stop me overeating at Christmas and while he is at it, clear my overdraft or find me a parking place.

Let's have a short break for a Wendy Cope poem:

When I went out shopping, I said a little prayer: 'Jesus, help me park the car for you are everywhere' Jesus in His goodness and grace, Jesus found me a parking space In a very convenient place.
Sound the horn and praise him!

What is more, the poem goes on to think of a parking place in the sky:

His eternal car-park
Is hidden from our eyes
Trust in Him and you will have
A space beyond the skies.

Wendy Cope is wonderful and knows that won't do, hence the poem; instead, we are worryingly free: a frightening thought but an exciting one. God's activity is in his forgiveness and his love. These are his gifts as shown in Jesus. We are forgiven and loved by God and we are invited to respond by following Jesus' life in our own lives. We are free to reply 'yes' to God's invitations and to do his will in the world, as countless people do.

We can, of course, refuse: if we can't be bothered ...or are too much tied up in a world which works differently from what God wishes.

It is time to give an example and today's theme provides one. God did not come among us with enormous power and strength. He came first in the New Testament account to Mary, and she responded in faith, as did Joseph; no avoidance, no excuses. Mary's response in faith gave her strength not only through preparation for the birth of Jesus, but also through a hard life as a mother.

Another example. What is it that we pray for in the Ukrainian war? It is not that God will suddenly cause Russian rockets to alter course or Putin to get ill. Rather it is that people in their strength, aided by God, will find a way to end the war. For those who are suffering in dire situations, God is present (as Jesus was) waiting to work through all of us. He invites repentance and gives strength and love; God works through everyone who responds to his call.

When invited to a party, we respond. In Advent, quite rightly, the Church stresses the urgency of the response we make to God's invitation. That is for two reasons. First, it is urgent because ours are the hands with which God works in the world. He has given us freedom. And it is urgent also because, on our response depends our readiness to meet God. The invitations are from Him; do we feel ready to meet him? How about a dream that a friend of mine had – of being met by Peter at the gates of heaven and asking to be shown round, only to see that the place was empty. 'Where are they all?'. Answer 'Oh I should have said; they are all out helping people in the other place'. Only a dream!

The urgency of Advent is often obscured by the Christmas season. Mary responded and is rightly held up as an example. And in Jesus, we see God's action in his world: loving activity, prayer, teaching, prepared to suffer that others may live. Respond to God's invitations. I like the story of an elderly Quaker woman who volunteered to go abroad and help refugees. Her friends said 'What... at your age?' To which the answer was 'At my age, I can do what I like'. That may sound a bit extreme. But it is freedom... and a response.

Post Communion

God our Father, in this night you have made known to us again the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ: confirm our faith and fix our eyes on him until the day dawns and Christ the Morning Star rises in our hearts. To him be glory both now and for ever.

So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. ¹⁹But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them. After eight days had passed, it was time to circumcise the child; and he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb.

Meet The People

Recently when I couldn't sleep, I lay there thinking about the church and the importance of the church within the community. Currently I take Morning Prayer at Aldeburgh one or two mornings each week and gradually, I have started getting a little more involved, so I began to think about all those volunteers within the church, the people behind the scenes who make things happen.

Behind our ministers is a team of resolute volunteers, people who are dedicated in diverse ways. Some of the roles require only a few hours each month others, depending on one's availability and the role they play, require a weekly commitment, but each volunteer makes such a difference to the church.

The next question rattling around in my head was, do I know who these people are, and the answer was sadly, NO and who does?

Whilst talking with the Revd' Sarah a few days later, I spoke about my thoughts and I could see her eyes light up immediately, "wouldn't it be a wonderful gesture to give some credit to the remarkable team of volunteers, not just in Aldeburgh, but within the Alde Sandling Benefice including Aldringham, Friston & Knodishall". I knew then that I had talked myself into a job.

Our Unsung Heroes

You may already be familiar with the faces of those involved in our church services, you see them on a regular basis, but even they do so much more than devotionally dress up and attend, to find out more, I'd like you to **Meet The People**, our **Unsung Heroes**.

Over a period of time, we will publish articles on our much needed and appreciated heroes, you will be very surprised to find out what goes on behind the scenes and how much effort our volunteers put in to make a difference.

Within this remit starting at St Peter's & St. Paul's church, Aldeburgh, the first bunch of people who sprung to mind immediately and who are very pertinent to this time of year, we could even describe them as being the 'loud voice' of the church, is our Bell Ringers.

Our Bell Ringers

Who honestly knows who they are? They could even be described as 'faceless people'. They arrive at church before a service commences, with around half of them having already rung elsewhere, (Theberton, Yoxford or

Campsea Ashe), climb the spiral staircase to the ringing chamber, do their bit and then leave quietly as the service starts, until the next time. They don't appear to need to be acknowledged, they just love what they do.

So, on a cold misty November evening I set off keen to meet this important team. I spoke with Richard Rapior the Tower Captain in advance, to ask if I could join them one Monday evening during their practice session, and as I left home armed with my notepad, I told my husband John that I would probably only be half an hour. However, I must confess they are such a lovely group of people and keen to tell me so much about their subject, that I was drawn in, I ended up staying the duration and loved it.

Assuming they all lived just around the corner somewhere, I was most surprised to hear that three are residents of Aldeburgh, the remainder of the band of ten or so, travel in from the surrounding area. Leiston, Yoxford, Cratfield & Stradbroke. That is quite some distance to travel on a miserable Monday evening during the winter. The team is fluid, and they also have the help of ringers from Theberton and Blaxhall assisting on Sunday mornings.

To show you how dedicated ringers are, Richard has second homeowners and others staying on the caravan site, regularly join them on a Sunday morning and they have been made very welcome. This is one of the remarkable things about ringing, when away from home, one can generally be assured of a warm welcome at whichever tower they happen to visit.

Richard started learning to ring in 1982 and says that one of the joys of ringing is that he is still learning. It is very much an activity that one can always improve on and develop other aspects of.

You don't need to be a regular church goer, ringers are of all faiths and none, from all walks of life and ranges in age. One can start to learn to ring from around the age of ten and there are still ringers active in their nineties. Ringing is very much a team activity and is both a physical and mental discipline with ringers coming from a very varied cross section of society. St Peter & St Paul's church in Aldeburgh has eight bells and 6 bells at a

minimum need to be used at one time. They vary in weight from eleven cwt., down to 3 cwt. We are lucky here in Aldeburgh to have such an active team of ringers, one of only two left in the Deanery.

It's not as easy as it looks, but like everything, the more you practice, the more competent you become. I did ask Richard how long it would take me to learn so that I would become a valuable member of the team, he suggested probably about a year.

Bell ringing is such a fascinating subject once you start to probe and the peals, which are attempted on the second Sunday afternoon of the month, could be described as the 'gold standard' whereby, the bells are rung continuously in over 5,000 different sequences, without visual aids, taking just under three hours to complete, the bell ringers equivalent of a


marathon and requires concentration and stamina. The peals can be included in special events locally and nationally.

There are various strands and levels of ringing undertaken at Aldeburgh and if anyone is interested in finding out more, they will be most welcome. Richard can be contacted on 01728 452261.

There will be some national publicity under the banner of "Ring for the King" to both encourage lapsed ringers to return and train new recruits for the Coronation and hopefully beyond.
