# Collect

# **First Reading**

# I Kings 8:22-30

Then Solomon stood before the altar of the Lord in the presence of all the assembly of Israel, and spread out his hands to heaven. He said, 'O Lord, God of Israel, there is no God like you in heaven above or on earth beneath, keeping covenant and steadfast love for your servants who walk before you with all their heart, the covenant that you kept for your servant my father David as you declared to him; you promised with your mouth and have this day fulfilled with your hand. Therefore, O Lord, God of Israel, keep for your servant my father David that which you promised him, saying, "There shall never fail you a successor before me to sit on the throne of Israel, if only your children look to their way, to walk before me as you have walked before me." Therefore, O God of Israel, let your word be confirmed, which you promised to your servant my father David. 'But will God indeed dwell on the earth? Even heaven and the highest heaven cannot contain you, much less this house that I have built! Have regard to your servant's prayer and his plea, O Lord my God, heeding the cry and the prayer that your servant prays to you today; that your eyes may be open night and day towards this house, the place of which you said, "My name shall be there", that you may heed the prayer that your servant prays towards this place. Hear the plea of your servant and of your people Israel when they pray towards this place; O hear in heaven your dwelling-place; heed and forgive.

# Second Reading Ephesians 6.10-20

Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power. Put on the whole armour of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. Therefore take up the whole armour of God, so that you may be able to withstand on that evil day, and having done everything, to stand firm. Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace. With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints. Pray also for me, so that when I speak, a message may be given to me to make known with boldness the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it boldly, as I must speak.

# Gospel Reading John 6.56-69

Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live for ever.' He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum. When many of his disciples heard it, they said, 'This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?' But lesus, being aware that his disciples were complaining about it, said to them, 'Does this offend you? Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before? It is the spirit that gives life; the flesh is useless. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life. But among you there are some who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the first who were the ones that did not believe, and who was the one that would betray him. And he said, 'For this reason I have told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted by the Father.' Because of this many of his disciples turned back and no longer went about with him. So lesus asked the twelve, 'Do you also wish to go away?' Simon Peter answered him, 'Lord, to whom can we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and know that you are the Holy One of God.'

### Summary of Sermon from Canon Bruce Gillingham, on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> August at Aldringham

### SIGNS OF A PROVOCATIVE CHURCH

#### Introduction

The Archbishop of Canterbury has commissioned Bishop Graham Tomlin to form a Centre of Cultural Witness to help the church to engage more credibly with current attitudes in our society today. So Bishop Graham has set up a website "Seen and Unseen" in which he invites comments, stories and reviews that throw light on the hope of the Christian gospel in our contemporary culture. He wrote a thoughtful book asking what a creative and engaged church might look like to provoke deep questions and wistful admiration in a watching world. He called it "The Provocative Church". I believe that our 3 readings today reveal three signs which would inspire St Andrews to become a provocative church. The internet works with www. And so do we!

(1) The first W stands for Wisdom.

In our Old Testament Reading (I Kings 3:3-14) we saw how God was pleased that Solomon had asked for the gift of wisdom above everything else: "I will do what you have asked. I will give you a wise and discerning heart" (I Kings 3:12). He was known as a wise and discerning king, and the wisdom of Solomon became proverbial in Israel and the surrounding nations.

If we want to tap into the wisdom literature of the Old Testament, we could look at that section of scripture that includes Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes and Song of Solomon. If that sounds a bit much, why not turn to Jesus's Sermon on the Mount, the summary of new covenant wisdom, and read Matthew 5-7? Instead of being worldly wise or repeating conventional wisdom, we might be granted the godly gift of divine wisdom for challenges facing the church, or for pastoral insight on real life issues facing members of our parishes.

(2) The second W stands for Worship

In our Epistle Reading (Ephesians 5:15-20) we saw how Paul was urging young believers in Ephesus to live distinctive and attractive lives in the compromised culture of a trading seaport, and that was inspired by renewed worship: "Speak to one another with psalms, hymns and spiritual songs. Sing and make music in your heart to the Lord" (Ephesians 5:19). They were called to live not as unwise, but as wise believers, making the most of every opportunity. Their Sunday worship would flow into their weekly witness in the world, not inspired by human distilled spirit but by God's divine Spirit.

It is good that this Sunday we have moved outside the church walls to celebrate our faith in the open air. Our first hymn rang out: "Let all the world in every corner sing, My God and King". Our worship includes attention to the holy scriptures, nourishment through the holy sacrament, and encounter with God in the power of the Holy Spirit. We are called to worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness, so together we can take heed to the apostolic command: "Do not get drunk on wine, which leads to debauchery. Instead, be filled with the Spirit" (Ephesians 5:18).

# (3) Our third W stands for Witness

In our Gospel Reading (John 6:51-58) we saw how Jesus was a powerful witness to the wonderful gift of eternal life that God was offering the world through his Son: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. If anyone eats of this bread, he will live for ever" (John 6:51). Many people are working hard to find a fulfilling and satisfying life, but even in material success they remain thirsty for more. Here Jesus holds out that extra dimension, the free gift of life with God: a purposeful life now and an eternal life forever. And this gift is for everyone, Jews and Gentiles alike: "This is the bread that came down from heaven. Your forefathers ate manna and died, but he who feeds on this bread will live for ever" (John 6:58).

Today we are celebrating Holy Communion in our sunny churchyard. We want to extend the Lord's invitation to come and eat and drink with him today, as a foretaste of our eternal destiny. "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him" (John 6:56). Let's start to imagine how we could hold out the generosity and hospitality of God to a hungry and hurting world.

#### Conclusion

The Lord is calling us to become a provocative church, both local and global. And we can play our part as we draw on the wisdom of God, engage in the worship of God, and participate in the witness of God. Taken together, these signs reflect the peace of God, the presence of Christ and the power of the Spirit active in the church, God's authentic Christian community. This is real, eternal life from God, for the world. We cannot keep it to ourselves, can we?

### **Post Communion**

God our creator, you feed your children with the true manna, the living bread from heaven: let this holy food sustain us through our earthly pilgrimage until we come to that place where hunger and thirst are no more; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

### Talk by Elder Ros Macallister from the 18<sup>th</sup> August at Knodishall

This week I am continuing the theme of Growing in God by thinking about Growing Younger.

### So, Growing Younger.

I expect that in all the ways that we are being asked to grow in our parishes and as a benefice, growing younger is the one on which we focus the most and which produces some of the deepest sighs at PCC meetings. Perhaps that is because we can all see the apparent "problem"- we as a church congregation are not getting any younger! I think it would appear to lots of younger people who have no regular contact with "the Church" that it is an old fashioned, out of touch institution which has no relevance to their modern life. Much of this assumption is based on limited contact with anyone from church, reports in the media about safeguarding scandals or the occasional reporting of an archbishop saying something. The Church has a long (and sometimes troubled) history. However, this does not mean that it has no future.

As congregations and PCCs we look to maintaining our church buildings, offering regular services and keeping the community and church family together, as a way of protecting the church for the next generations. We have been challenged by the bishops in this diocese to think about how we can Grow Younger. So, is it just to get some younger members on the PCC that we are thinking about this? Although that would be a useful result, I think that as Christians our most important mission is to bring people nearer to God and to help them grow in their faith. If we are thinking of attracting younger people to come to know God, we must start where they are. It may be that they were baptized as babies and that they feel a link, however tenuous, with the church. A starting point from which they can find out more. Many younger people feel that they are seeking "something", feel a need to protect the environment, to protect the world. They may be looking for a secure moral framework which gives them the security that is missing from their own particular circumstances. To believe in something.

As Christians we know that having a relationship with God is the most wonderful and special thing which enriches our lives. It is unlike anything else. But I think that being Christian, needs to be seen as normal too-not ordinary or without meaning, but not unusual or weird either. It's great when Sarah and Mary get the chance to meet people outside what is seen as a Church space. At the Youth Club, Friday Markets, the Flower Show or walking the dogs around the village. Setting someone off on their faith journey doesn't have to start in a church building, hopefully growing their faith through worship will follow on.

So, what about us.

We can help our benefice to grow younger by supporting Sarah in her efforts to bring a Children's and Families worker to minister here. The contact this person will have with families means it's not just the children they can support. Being involved in Church services and in youth activities in the community will bring chances to grow relationships between our church family and those children and parents they work with. However, we can do the most important thing. We can pray. Even if we can no longer move tables, mow churchyards, or do so much practical stuff.

We can pray about how to Grow in God in our church here.

We are called in Scripture to be like children. If not in years, in attitude, we can be younger and more childlike. John and I have two small children living next door to us. Seeing their trust in their parents when they are exploring the world, their curiosity in every new thing, reminds me to be outward looking, to seek new opportunities to foster faith in others. We can be curious about how to do God's will here in our small rural churches and we can display that childlike trust in Him that will be a beacon to others who observe it.

Lord, help us to trust in you as we plan to Grow Younger

We pray that we may find the right person to work with children and families here.

Help us to recognize opportunities to bring others of whatever age nearer to You.

May our faith, our words and actions be beacons shining out to young people.

And may we grow in our own faith as we come to know and love you better.
