Collect

God, who in generous mercy sent the Holy Spirit upon your Church in the burning fire of your love: grant that your people may be fervent in the fellowship of the gospel that, always abiding in you, they may be found steadfast in faith and active in service; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Proverbs 22.1-2, 8-9, 22-23

A good name is to be chosen rather than great riches, and favour is better than silver or gold. The rich and the poor have this in common: the Lord is the maker of them all. Whoever sows injustice will reap calamity, and the rod of anger will fail. Those who are generous are blessed, for they share their bread with the poor. Do not rob the poor because they are poor, or crush the afflicted at the gate; for the Lord pleads their cause and despoils of life those who despoil them.

Second Reading

James 2.1-10 11-13 14-17

My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favouritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, 'Have a seat here, please', while to the one who is poor you say, 'Stand there', or, 'Sit at my feet', have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? But you have dishonoured the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? You do well if you really fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill', and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

Gospel Reading Mark 7.24-end

From there he set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, 'Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' But she answered him, 'Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs.' Then he said to her, 'For saying that, you may go-the demon has left your daughter.' So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone. Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to

heaven, he sighed and said to him, 'Ephphatha', that is, 'Be opened.' And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, 'He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak.'

Sermon from Revd Nichola Winter, on Sunday Ist September at Friston

John Greenleaf Whittier (1807-92) - would probably have been horrified at the thought of his words being sung in church. The words of our first hymn (Dear Lord and Father of Mankind) this morning are part of a long poem he wrote comparing the 'heartiness and excitement of much Christian worship to the stimulation found by followers of certain Eastern religions through the use of hallucinogenic drugs.'

Whittier was an early anti-slavery campaigner and despite his dislike of singing in worship (he was a Quaker and much preferred silence) more than 50 of his poems have been turned into hymns. 'The brewing of Soma' was written in 1872 and speaks of an intoxicating drink probably made from the fungus Amanita muscaria and used in Vedic rituals in India. (see Dorothy L Sayers: The Documents in the Case for a good crime novel based on this...) Scraps of the fungus would be steeped in milk and, when digested, produce a strongly hallucinogenic effect and induce a state of religious frenzy.

It was these religious frenzies that Whittier condemned as 'our foolish ways' that need God's forgiveness. His poem expresses the Quaker belief that God is to be found in silence and stillness rather than noisy frenzy; the inward peace of the worshipper brings one closer to God than indulging in noisy sound, outward stimulation and sensual excitement.

And that brings us rather neatly to the reading from The Song of Solomon... Probably one of the most sensual parts of the bible this writing celebrates the sheer joy of sensual and erotic love. Does it have place in a book that can be seen as giving a strict code of living? Well, as one former bishop once said, 'if there's no fun in heaven, I'm not going...' This passage is often read at weddings - even though the subject matter was originally intended to celebrate love between young unmarried female and male lovers - but it celebrates the beauty of God's gift of human love. Various studies have attempted to interpret the poem in the light of feminist

theology and other cultural perspectives but if we accept it as a hymn of praise to human - and divine - love we're not going far wrong. There is a beautiful setting of some of the words by Walton... which create an opportunity for singing praises to the many gifts of God - as indeed we do here, Sunday by Sunday, when we come to church, amongst other things, to sing God's praise.

Both the passages from James and the Gospel remind us that we need to guard our tongues and watch what we say and sing. Just lately we have probably been shocked at the slogans coming from the mouths of various protesters and rioters as they execute their right to demonstrate their displeasure at certain aspects of life. But we would all do well to think hard before we blurt out our immediate responses to things we disagree with. We need to consider and to reflect. It's not easy. I know that I can be guilty of coming out with an initial response to a news item or comment that isn't particularly charitable. We live in a chattering age and these things happen so quickly and easily. But Jesus reminds us that it doesn't matter how much we stick to dietary codes and ablutionary rules - it isn't what goes into the body that defiles but what comes out in terms of words, worship and actions.

'This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines. You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition,' says Jesus. James enlarges on this theme as we hear today:

'If any think they are religious, and do not bridle their tongues but deceive their hearts, their religion is worthless. Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to care for orphans and widows in their distress, and to keep oneself unstained by the world.'

Keeping ourselves unstained by the world is a hard task, beset as we are by the temptations and superficial follies of 21st century life. 'Forgive our foolish ways', we sing. The brewing of Soma may well bring about frenzy and fervour but we live in a society where the comfortable and the uncomfortable almost go hand in hand. That still small voice of calm continues to whisper amidst all the shouting, all the violence, all the chaos. On a trip to the Holy Land in the '90s Nick & I sang 'Dear Lord and Father' with fellow pilgrims on a boat on the Sea of Galilee. The water was calm then, but above our heads there was the continual buzz of helicopters - a reminder that the time then was not one of peace but of tension in the Middle East - as it still is today.

We need to keep our ears open for the words that calm and still us, that lead us to reflect and cause us to take a moment aside in our busy lives. When we're tempted to give vent to our frustration and anger, let us pause, to ensure that what comes out of our mouths is gentle, charitable and constructive. We'd do well to heed the advice of Mrs Dashwood in Jane Austen's Sense & Sensibility when she says to her youngest daughter, Margaret:

'Hush, Margaret, if you can't think of anything appropriate to say you will please restrict your remarks to the weather.'

We might paraphrase that for ourselves - when we can't think of anything appropriate to say let us at least remember God, our maker, redeemer and sustainer. Instead of words out loud we might simply offer words in the silence of our hearts - words of praise and thankfulness for what is good in the world. Perhaps the words from the Collect:

Almighty God, whose only Son has opened for us a new and living way into your presence: give us pure hearts and steadfast wills to worship you in spirit and in truth;

May what comes out of our mouths always do just that. Amen.

Keep, O Lord, your Church, with your perpetual mercy; and, because without you our human frailty cannot but fall, keep us ever by your help from all things hurtful, and lead us to all things profitable to our salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
