# Collect

# First Reading Genesis 28.10-17

Jacob left Beer-sheba and went towards Haran. He came to a certain place and stayed there for the night, because the sun had set. Taking one of the stones of the place, he put it under his head and lay down in that place. And he dreamed that there was a ladder set up on the earth, the top of it reaching to heaven; and the angels of God were ascending and descending on it. And the Lord stood beside him and said, 'I am the Lord, the God of Abraham your father and the God of Isaac; the land on which you lie I will give to you and to your offspring; and your offspring shall be like the dust of the earth, and you shall spread abroad to the west and to the east and to the north and to the south; and all the families of the earth shall be blessed in you and in your offspring. Know that I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land; for I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you.' #### Sermon from The Very Revd Christopher Lewis, on Sunday 22nd September at Knodishall's Harvest Festival

Congratulations on the church decoration and on the arrangements for harvest lunch. It is very good to be here at festival time - especially true for me as I help my brother with harvest; he farms near Colchester. 'Help' is something full of meaning, because he or his daughter drive the combine, and I sometimes collect the result in a tractor with trailer, then drive to the barns. The art is to back a trailer into the barn without destroying the barn door, and once in, without wrecking the roof when the trailer needs to be tipped up. I only say this because being involved in harvest is all very satisfying and fits well with today's first reading from the prophet Joel: 'Do not fear, O soil; be glad and rejoice, for the Lord has done great things!' And we thank God for the harvest as in the letter of St Paul to Timothy, urging prayer and thanksgiving... and then we hear the Gospel reading which tells us that we should not worry ourselves too much about what we will eat or what we will drink.

None of this means that we should cease to be concerned about our world from every angle, one angle being how we farm the land and also generally how we look after it. We have become more aware than the bible writers were, and therefore more conscious of CO2 and the like....AND of Thames Water poisoning rivers with sewage. Never forget David Attenborough or Greta Thunberg. And perhaps we should be reminded not to forget the joys of biodiversity, even as far as slugs...slugs, by the way, often much hated, but according to the Royal Horticultural Society a valuable part of the composting process...welcome in the garden for they re-cycle. Imagine them going into Noah's ark two by two in Benjamin Britten's 'Noye's Fludde', singing "Kyrie, Kyrie, Kyrie eleison'.

Whatever the circumstances, we need a fresh vision of the world; seeing it in a new way. People in the Royal Navy will object if you ask them 'Which ship are you ON?'; they will tell you that the question should be 'Which ship are you IN?'. One is in ships not on them, and we should live very much IN the world not just on it. We are a part of it...along with the slugs, all part of God's creation.

That is one stage of Christian thinking; it could be called the ecological or green stage. The world is not something to manipulate, for it is mysterious, even sacred: a wonderful and interdependent whole. No wonder there is campaigning in these parts in favour of electrical offshore ring-mains and against other developments such as the nuclear power station planned to be built on a crumbling coast. Religious and other insights can combine, for it IS God's world. And that means a prophetic voice is needed. We could put it like this. The world is God's creation. He sent his Son Jesus to live in the world in order to show, in a definite and clear way, Father and Son's love for the world and their wish that its inhabitants live peaceably and lovingly in it. And God is present in the Holy Spirit, all the time giving us strength and guidance as we try to lead a loving and reasonable life in God's world.

Put it a different way for the Christian: that we need to be down to earth and practical and then at the very same time we need to be doing God's will – knowing what it is to be faithful to God the creator. I had the opportunity recently to meet some first nation i.e. indigenous people in the north of Canada, right up by the arctic circle. They are very aware of their daily life in the world and yet also of their response to God as the creator of it all. In their translations of the bible and other religious works, God is always described as the Creator. They are conscious of God as intimately involved in the created world, not just in great moments of the past, but now and in everyday life. There they are, very conscious of the surrounding world, as are many Christians in South Africa and elsewhere.

We can look to Jesus for help. Often people just stress one side of his life, what one might call the godly side: his prayers, his love of the Father, his example as devout and caring all the time. Yet at the same time, there is the Jesus who had emerged from a world of carpentry, who understood the fishermen whom he called, who shared food, who lived very much in the world, transforming people's lives in it. It would be wrong to say 'feet on the ground and head in the clouds' for those words encourage the wrong kind of picture. Better to say that he and his Father were one, close to each other and yet very much involved in everyday life in the world. Jesus' earthly acts always reflect the wish of the Father.

So that is something which we can grasp at harvest time: perhaps for us we CAN say: 'saying our prayers with our feet on the ground'. The two tied together. One side immersed in a loving God and the other immersed in everyday life, with the two inter-twined. And then there is the matter of food itself: the product of the harvest shared. Churches supporting food banks for those in need locally, but also remembering those in need all over the world.

All over the world....that raises a different question, but one which many face. I have a brother-in-law who is well able to drive lorries. So now, in retirement he does all sorts of driving for the organisation called 'Hope and Aid' which supports refugees in all sorts of places, for example Ukrainian refugees in Poland who need food, mattresses, toys. He was even involved in the journey of the amazing great refugee puppet called Little Amal (Amal is the Arabic for hope), the aim being to spread the news about the sheer number and needs of refugees all over the place, Amal being an example of a refugee child looking for her parents.

What better than today to reflect on our hopes and prayers for God's world. That is harvest. Yet it is also a festival, so we can enjoy it and give thanks for the wonders of world and the right use of its products.

# **Friston Update**


Friston PCC would like to say thank you to Mary &
