Collect

Almighty Father, whose will is to restore all things in your beloved Son, the King of all: govern the hearts and minds of those in authority, and bring the families of the nations, divided and torn apart by the ravages of sin, to be subject to his just and gentle rule; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Jonah 3.1-5, 10

The word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time, saying, 'Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you.' So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, 'Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!' And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth. When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them; and he did not do it.

Second Reading Hebrews 9.24-end

For Christ did not enter a sanctuary made by human hands, a mere copy of the true one, but he entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf. Nor was it to offer himself again and again, as the high priest enters the Holy Place year after year with blood that is not his own; for then he would have had to suffer again and again since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the age to remove sin by the sacrifice of himself. And just as it is appointed for mortals to die once, and after that the judgement, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin, but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

Gospel Reading Mark 1.14-20

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news.' As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the lake-for they were fishermen. And Jesus said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you fish for people.' And immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.

Arthur's daughter, Liz, would like to thank those of you who attended the Service of Thanksgiving on Friday 1st November and for the kind donations made to The Institute of Cancer Research in his memory. Thank you also for the many kind messages and support given over the last few weeks - it has meant a lot.

Many people have asked if we can add Bishop Sandy Millar's sermon that he wrote for Arthur's Thanksgiving service on the 1st November – so here it is. There were also handouts given out about Arthur's life written by Liz and Arthur's Granddaughter Emma. Please email Claire if you would like an electronic copy.

When Arthur and Pam came to live in Aldeburgh nearly 25 years ago (sadly Pam died only three years later) Arthur very quickly settled into the community, being the lover of people that he was. I have to be a little bit careful as he didn't want us to spend time talking about him – that was part of the instructions that he left for this service- but I am sure he won't mind as he was such an important part of the community for so long and will be, is already, very much missed. We'll miss the clinking of a barrow full of glass bottles on their way to the bottle bank at the bottom of the hill; we'll miss seeing him working away in the garden, which he was still doing up to a few days before he died. We'll miss him very much in Church life with his gift for the organisation of things, printed orders of service, books and general clutter, his love for the Book of Common Prayer and the Piper window but, more importantly, his care for and interest in people which must have been a factor in his early decision to move from accountancy to the ordained ministry. He celebrated the 70th year of priesthood on the 4th June last year when Derek Johnson invited him to consecrate at the 8am Holy Communion in the Parish Church here. Arthur was a bible man as many of you will know. When John Giles visited him shortly before he died John asked him which bit of the bible Arthur would like him to read. Arthur's reply..." you could start with Genesis and read on to the end of Revelation." He retained his very slightly mischievous sense of fun with I often thought, a delightful touch of eccentricity, to the end. We will all have our very happy memories of Arthur, a great and much missed character, with a love for people who looked after everyone, and above all a great love for God.


On an occasion like this I always think we tend to spend our time looking in three directions. Some of the time we spend looking back and, despite dear Arthur's typically humble request not to, we have done a bit of that and will go on remembering things for some time to come. But we also look forward, and that is something he was very clear about. The sermon is to include a message of comfort and hope with a proclamation of the gospel.

In St John chapter 14 Jesus is talking about the future. He specifically says to his disciples "Do not let your hearts be troubled...in my Father's house are many rooms... I am going there to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am. You know the way to the place where I am going." Thomas said to him "Lord, we don't know where you are going, so how can we know the way?" Jesus answered "I am the way, and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." St Paul develops that theme in his letter to the Corinthians, it isn't uncomplicated but well worth studying, this is what he says" But Christ has indeed been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made alive." The point is this...Adam rebelled against God and wilfully defied Him...in this way he caused a breakdown in relationship with God which all his descendants have inherited. Jesus came to restore that relationship and when He went to the Cross He took in one hand all the sins that you and I have ever committed and in the other hand all the sins that we would ever commit crying "IT IS FINISHED"..."I have finished what I came to do..." We killed Him...but God raised Him up again...and if we believe that and the implications of that we become part of the new creation and God will raise us up at the general resurrection of the dead when all those what St Paul calls "in Christ" are raised up from the dead. It is what that will

look like that St Paul is dealing with in our lesson today, the one that Arthur was so keen for us to read, and we get there by faith, that is to say we dare to believe what Jesus promised, and we find that it is true. So, as Christians, we don't grieve like those who don't believe because we know that those who believe in Christ will be amongst those who are raised from the dead at the last day, as Christ has been.

So, we've looked back a bit, we have been looking forward and meanwhile, we look up. I don't know where all this finds you? You may say.."absolutely I have given myself to Christ and put my trust in Him for eternity." But you may say well I am not so sure, may I encourage you to explore, join an Alpha course somewhere. We have nearly finished this one but I feel sure there will be another soon.

But there may be one person here who says I'd like to be sure, and I'd like to pray a prayer now. I'm going to pray a very simple prayer that I know works, and I invite you to echo it in your heart. here then is the prayer...
