Collect

Heavenly Father, whose blessed Son was revealed to destroy the works of the devil and to make us the children of God and heirs of eternal life: grant that we, having this hope, may purify ourselves even as he is pure; that when he shall appear in power and great glory we may be made like him in his eternal and glorious kingdom; where he is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Daniel 12.1-3

At that time Michael, the great prince, the protector of your people, shall arise. There shall be a time of anguish, such as has never occurred since nations first came into existence. But at that time your people shall be delivered, everyone who is found written in the book. Many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, some to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt. Those who are wise shall shine like the brightness of the sky, and those who lead many to righteousness, like the stars for ever and ever.

Second Reading Hebrews 10.11-14 15-18 19-25

And every priest stands day after day at his service, offering again and again the same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, 'he sat down at the right hand of God', and since then has been waiting 'until his enemies would be made a footstool for his feet.' For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are sanctified. Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain (that is, through his flesh) and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

Gospel Reading Mark 13.1-8

As he came out of the temple, one of his disciples said to him, 'Look, Teacher, what large stones and what large buildings!' Then Jesus asked him, 'Do you see these great buildings! Not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down.' When he was sitting on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John, and Andrew asked him privately, 'Tell us, when will this be, and what will be the sign that all these things are about to be accomplished!' Then Jesus began to say to them, 'Beware that no one leads you astray. Many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and they will lead many astray. When you hear of wars and rumours of wars, do not be alarmed; this must take place, but

the end is still to come. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines. This is but the beginning of the birth pangs.

Sermon by Revd Mary Brown at Aldringham's Remembrance Sunday Service

The First World War was originally referred to as the Great War. It was expected to be the war to end all wars. And yet, only 21 years later, not even a generation, the hopes of a lasting peace were dashed, and the world was once again at war. Communities which had barely begun to heal were torn apart again, griefs were rekindled, fears re-lived. Men whose families had rejoiced at their return set out to fight another enemy.

With our distance from these events it can be hard to really imagine, or clearly remember, what it was like for those who went to war, and for those left behind. But all of us are likely to have some personal experience of the ripple effects of the tragedy of war, especially the Second World War. Not enough years have passed for such horrific events to reach the limit of their impact on individuals, families, nations, cultures. Many of us here today will have experienced the long term effects of war, perhaps on yourselves as people who were evacuated as children or lost a close relative, or on our parents, our grand parents, or others close to us in a way that impacted us.

Today on Remembrance Sunday we mark this. We gather to remember, to remind ourselves of the impact of war, and to honour those who died. We hope that in remembering, our desire to work towards peace will be renewed and refreshed.

Our gospel reading today reminds us of Christ's call to follow him. We are told how Jesus went to the Sea of Galilee 'proclaiming the good news of God and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." And how in response to this call, these men left everything, turned their lives upside down, and followed Jesus.

Soon we will be in the Advent season and we will start hearing the familiar Advent readings, including Isaiah 9 verse 6, which foretells Jesus' birth - 'For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given, and the government will be upon his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.' It is into this kingdom that Jesus was

calling these Galilean fishermen, and it is into this kingdom that he calls each one of us today. Jesus is the Prince of Peace.

As we gather to remember the loss of war, we are reminded of the gift of peace that Jesus offers us.

Jesus said 'repent and believe the good news' - the good news that the kingdom of God is near, and we are each invited to become part of it. The kingdom of God is a kingdom unlike any other we have known. It is a kingdom of peace and joy and hope and love. When Jesus calls us to follow him, as he did these first disciples, he calls us to give up our lives as we know them, to choose to put down our own aims and agendas, and swap them for God's agenda. And this is what we see happening in our reading from Jonah. The people of Nineveh - which historians argue was one of the most violent kingdoms in the ancient near east - heard Jonah's call to repentance, followed it, and changed their lives, as the reading says they 'turned from their evil ways.'

As we gather to remember the evil of war, we are called to repentance, to turn our lives to Christ and to live for Him not for ourselves.

Our reading from Hebrews tells us how Jesus brought His Kingdom near, and how he made a way for us to live in it. The writer compares Jesus, our Great High Priest, to the high priests of the earthly temple in Jerusalem. Those high priests had to repeat the sacrifice year on year. Jesus offered himself as the sacrifice for sin 'once for all'.

I started by talking about the First World War being seen as the war to end all wars, and yet it wasn't. The writer to the Hebrews tells us that Jesus' sacrifice of himself on the cross, was the sacrifice to end all sacrifices.

Jesus' sacrifice of himself on the cross was the final blow in his war against sin and death, and with it he won the victory. Victory over death, victory over sin, victory over all forms of suffering. Jesus' victory was confirmed when he rose from the dead, and then ascending to heaven where, as our reading tells us, he stands 'in the presence of God on our behalf'.

This is the good news that Jesus calls us to believe. That we are invited to repent, to turn our lives around, and to follow Jesus, the Prince of Peace, into his Kingdom of Peace.

But we don't need to look far to see that today wars continue, violence continues, mothers still say goodbye to sons, and daughters, not knowing if they will return. Though the victory is won, and Christ has defeated

death, we live in the now and not yet. We know the battle is won, but we are waiting for the peace to be established. This is what the final line of the reading from Hebrews is about: 'Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.'

Those who have followed Christ into his kingdom are those who are eagerly waiting for him, waiting for the day when wars will cease, when suffering will be no more, and as we heard in our reading last week - when God himself will wipe the tears from our eyes.

As we gather to remember the sacrifice of those who died in war, we are reminded of the sacrifice that Christ made for us, giving himself over to death on the cross so that we might be saved in him.

We have talked about the ripple effects of war, that despite our distance from the First and Second World Wars, we still feel their effects on our families, communities and nations today. Wars shape people and places for years after they have ended.

The good news is that Jesus' kingdom also has ripple effects, it also shapes individuals, families, communities and nations, but unlike war, Jesus shapes our lives for good.

So let's all hear Jesus today as he says to us 'the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." And if you feel unsure about what that good news is, I'd love to invite you to come to the Alpha course which will be running here in Aldringham starting in the new year. Please come and talk to me about it at the end, or look out for details in Pew News and posters.


Post Communion
