First Reading Daniel 7.9-10, 13-14

As I watched, thrones were set in place, and an Ancient One took his throne; his clothing was white as snow, and the hair of his head like pure wool; his throne was fiery flames, and its wheels were burning fire. A stream of fire issued and flowed out from his presence. A thousand thousand served him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood attending him. The court sat in judgement, and the books were opened. As I watched in the night visions, I saw one like a human being coming with the clouds of heaven. And he came to the Ancient One and was presented before him. To him was given dominion and glory and kingship, that all peoples, nations, and languages should serve him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not pass away, and his kingship is one that shall never be destroyed.

Second Reading Revelation 1.4b-8

John to the seven churches that are in Asia: Grace to you and peace from him who is and who was and who is to come, and from the seven spirits who are before his throne, and from Jesus Christ, the faithful witness, the firstborn of the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth. To him who loves us and freed us from our sins by his blood, and made us to be a kingdom, priests serving his God and Father, to him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen. Look! He is coming with the clouds; every eye will see him, even those who pierced him; and on his account all the tribes of the earth will wail. So it is to be. Amen. 'I am the Alpha and the Omega', says the Lord God, who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty.

Gospel Reading John 18.33-37

Then Pilate entered the headquarters again, summoned Jesus, and asked him, 'Are you the King of the Jews?' Jesus answered, 'Do you ask this on your own, or did others tell you about me?' Pilate replied, 'I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests have handed you over to me. What have you done?' Jesus answered, 'My kingdom is not from this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here.' Pilate asked him, 'So you are a king?' Jesus answered, 'You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice.'

Sermon by The Very Revd Christopher Lewis at Frison 17th November

This is a strange time in the Church's year, when we look forwards and have chilling readings from the Bible. There is little comfort; at this time, we are not even preparing for Christmas. So today's Gospel reading: Jesus is reported as saying: 'For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines. This is but the beginning of the birth pangs.' Or, I could have chosen a verse from the first reading (from the Jewish Scriptures): Daniel (12;1-3): 'There shall be a time of anguish, such as had never occurred since nations first came into existence'.

We could, of course, try applying these verses to current events...the Middle East. Through the ages, many have done that and warned us that the end is imminent, with evidence from the state of the world: wars and rumours of wars. Yet I reckon that warning would be a mistake, not because the international situation isn't worrying, but rather because an imminent end, an apocalyptic happening, lets us off the hook – and anyway, given the failure of past predictions (some comic), it's pretty unlikely to happen. Why does it let us off the hook? Because an imminent end of everything takes the strain and stress away and means that you can sit around (as millenarian groups sometimes do) and wait to be lifted off, swallowed up or whatever – as with the Rapture movement in the USA.

The message of these readings is different. The message is more that counter to what everyone says about Christianity, 'stress is good for your soul'. To say that, I realize, goes against the grain, for we are always praying for peace ...out and about in the world and also in ourselves. But even the most peaceable of Christians, especially the most peace-loving of Christians, can have a sharp sense of the inadequacy of all things and want to work hard in the power of the Spirit in order to bring about a better world, nearer to the kingdom of God. The sad state of the world is a challenge to us all, rather than a message that we should expect rescue, or that we should retreat into ourselves.

I am never sure about those posters that people put up on their walls: 'Go placidly...' – perhaps their message is 'don't go anywhere at all'. I know, of course, that too much stress is bad for your health. But if you want a message to take away from this sermon, it is that too little stress is bad for your soul and that numerous parts of the Bible and of the Christian tradition support such a view.

Enough...here's an example. Today, 17th November, is the day on which St Hugh of Lincoln died in the year 1200: in those days he was the bishop of a lot of England. A French monk (he had some trouble with his

English!); a man of faith and of prayer, for sure. Yet also one who defended the poor and cared for them, negotiated for the future of peasants, saved the lives of Jews in the infamous riots in Stamford in 1190; washed the feet of lepers ... all this while administering his diocese with care and sensitivity. He infuriated those in power by speaking out against the evils of kings such as king John of England and by protecting the rights of the Church.

One could say, of course, that he had it easy in a way: that was an age of faith, and the Church and Bishops had lots of power. But human beings were much the same and the same kinds of things went wrong and went right.

One of the most striking and moving records about Hugh was what happened on his deathbed. He had annoyed the Archbishop of Canterbury, Hubert Walter - crusader, brilliant statesman, lover of wealth and power, a champagne bishop - Hugh annoyed the Archbishop so many times by his criticisms of those in power that the Archbishop asked for a deathbed apology. Hugh's answer was as follows: "I do not consider that I should repent of angering you, but rather grieve that I did not do so more often...I remember that several times I weakly suppressed my opinion because I knew you would not take it kindly if I spoke. My sin was that I preferred to offend God rather than to offend you. For this reason I ask forgiveness for my failure against God and against you. If I am spared, I am resolved not to fail in this way again." There speaks a man famed for his piety, his sanctity, but also for his actions in working to bring in the kingdom of God, in among all the complex problems of the world. Peace in his heart and a right amount of stress in his life. In him, faith and prayer led to action, good organization and objections to evil.

It is probably true that the part of the Christian faith which most appeals to people today is that of personal peace and joy: the experience of God's love and the longing for a new world shaped more nearly in the image of Jesus Christ. Those aspects of Christianity are all central to the faith. Yet there are also more jagged, stressful, painful aspects which we need to come to terms with at this time of year. As someone brought up in Essex (!), I can get away with saying that readings like those of today are the Essex man of the Bible and of the Christian year: coarse and unwanted, gate-crashing the civilized party, raising the stress level and generally lacking in any good taste. Yet as we clear up the smashed glass after the party, we can reflect that tough language is very much part of the Christian and indeed of the Jewish tradition: beware, prepare.

It is no good saying in a sermon: 'Things will get a bit worrying, but you should go along to your friendly priest and he will tell you it's alright really', for it isn't. Like St Hugh, we have the immense central staggering wonderful promise of God's presence with us – God as he is in Jesus

Christ our Lord, in the power of the Spirit. It is with that promise and the knowledge of that presence and example that we, like St Hugh, can face a world which is far from OK and in which, to quote from St Mark's Gospel: 'nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines'. And there God will be too: his presence and guidance, his strength and support. Amen.

Post Communion

Stir up, O Lord, the wills of your faithful people; that they, plenteously bringing forth the fruit of good works, may by you be plenteously rewarded; through Jesus Christ our Lord.


