#### **Collect**

O Lord, raise up, we pray, your power and come among us, and with great might succour us; that whereas, through our sins and wickedness we are grievously hindered in running the race that is set before us, your bountiful grace and mercy may speedily help and deliver us; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, to whom with you and the Holy Spirit, be honour and glory, now and for ever.

## First Reading Malachi 3.1-4

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight-indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears? For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the Lord in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the Lord as in the days of old and as in former years.

# Second Reading Philippians 1.3-11

I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. It is right for me to think this way about all of you, because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me, both in my imprisonment and in the defence and confirmation of the gospel. For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the compassion of Christ Jesus. And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight to help you to determine what is best, so that on the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

## Gospel Reading Luke 3.1-6

In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, during the high-priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah, 'The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight. Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

# Sermon by Revd Sarah du Boulay at Aldringham Ist December

So, finally, it's advent Sunday – the first day of the period leading up to Christmas Day itself. So to celebrate, I'd like to share with you a poem about Epiphany – the occasion when we celebrate the arrival of the magi or the kings, or the wise men. Bear with me! Advent is a time of realisation and recognition of Christ, and that's the whole package. This particular poem is actually a sonnet, and is written by the Christian poet, Malcolm Guite.

It might have been just someone else's story,
Some chosen people get a special king.
We leave them to their own peculiar glory,
We don't belong, it doesn't mean a thing.
But when these three arrive they bring us with them,
Gentiles like us, their wisdom might be ours;
A steady step that finds an inner rhythm,
A pilgrim's eye that sees beyond the stars.
They did not know his name but still they sought him,
They came from otherwhere but still they found;
In temples they found those who sold and bought him,
But in the filthy stable, hallowed ground.
Their courage gives our questing hearts a voice
To seek, to find, to worship, to rejoice.

I wanted to share this poem for two reasons. One is the first two lines, which say;

It might have been just someone else's story, Some chosen people get a special king.

It might have been someone else's story. The story of Christmas, and the life of Jesus, and the events of the crucifixion and resurrection might have been something which was relevant to other people. People we never knew. But it's not. This is our story. This story relates to us, beginning thousands and thousands of years ago, and through the generations, through the centuries, our story, yours and mine, and will be the story of our descendants. We are the chosen people who have received the special king.

The second reason is the two lines:

A steady step that finds an inner rhythm, A pilgrim's eye that sees beyond the stars.

Remember, the season of Advent is about journeying towards Christmas day – travelling together towards remembering the birth of the Christ-child. Towards the second coming of Jesus. A steady step that finds an inner rhythm. A pilgrim's eye that sees beyond the stars.

It is important that we see the whole story. Not just the events before us, but that we understand the whole meaning and the history behind it. One of the reasons that we remember the patriarchs on the first Sunday of Advent is because it is so important that we recognise that we are all part of the same family of worship. The same lineage. The same family of God. Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, the patriarchs of the Bible, were near the beginning of that lineage. The name 'Abraham' means literally 'great father'. This was ironic because he was, of course, childless for the majority of his lifetime. God made a covenant with Abraham - that if Abraham gave his life to God, then God would honour him by making him the father of the nations. It was because of his trust in God that Abraham became the leader first of a great family, and then the ancestor of all the Jewish tribes. And God comes to us with that same invitation - if you give me your life, I will give you my life - eternal life. Salvation. Life in all it's fullness. This line of course then passes through King David and Jesus - the prophecy given in our Old Testament reading today. We may (or may not) be blood descendants of Abraham, but we are part of the same family of faith.

And it all ties in together; the stories of the Old Testament are the stories of personal faith being deeply connected with collective faith. The faith of Abraham, David, Isaac, Jacob, the individuals deeply connected with the collective faith of the Jewish nation, and now, some 4,000 years later, connected to us. Right here, in this church on the coast of Suffolk. The story of the patriarchs shows us that it is better to journey together in faith, than to wander alone. We are part of the family of God. We are better together. We journey, together. We worship, together. We pray, together. We love, together.

As a team, a group, as a lineage, we are stronger than individually. God has given us all we need, we are pilgrims together on this journey. You will have noticed that so many of St Paul's epistles speak eloquently (and at great length) about praying for other Christians. About supporting others on their faith journey. About longing to meet with one another and to share the good news of the Gospel, so that everybody will come to know Jesus.

We are those chosen people. The special king has been born as a human child, and he is coming again. We don't know when, we don't know where. Our Gospel reading today speaks of that second coming, and says:

'Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life, and that day does not catch you unexpectedly, 35 like a trap. For it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth. 36 Be alert at all times, praying that you may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place, and to stand before the Son of Man.'

That is what we do during Advent. We keep watch. We keep alert. And we do it together. We are those pilgrims, with the steady step, journeying towards what has been promised us. Just like the magi we will remember during Epiphany. Just like the 12 tribes of Judea. Just like the disciples. Just like millions of people before and after us. That great cloud of witnesses.

#### **Post Communion**

Father in heaven, who sent your Son to redeem the world and will send him again to be our judge: give us grace so to imitate him in the humility and purity of his first coming that, when he comes again, we may be ready to greet him with joyful love and firm faith; through Jesus Christ our Lord.


