Collect

God our redeemer, who prepared the Blessed Virgin Mary to be the mother of your Son: grant that, as she looked for his coming as our saviour, so we may be ready to greet him when he comes again as our judge; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Micah 5.2-5a

But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days. Therefore he shall give them up until the time when she who is in labour has brought forth; then the rest of his kindred shall return to the people of Israel. And he shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the Lord, in the majesty of the name of the Lord his God. And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great to the ends of the earth; and he shall be the one of peace. If the Assyrians come into our land and tread upon our soil, we will raise against them seven shepherds and eight installed as rulers.

Second Reading Hebrews 10.5-10

Consequently, when Christ came into the world, he said, 'Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me; in burnt-offerings and sin-offerings you have taken no pleasure. Then I said, "See, God, I have come to do your will, O God" (in the scroll of the book it is written of me).' When he said above, 'You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt-offerings and sin-offerings' (these are offered according to the law), then he added, 'See, I have come to do your will.' He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

Gospel Reading

Luke 1.39-45 46-55

In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leapt in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, 'Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leapt for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfilment of what was spoken to her by the Lord.' And Mary said, 'My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour, for he has looked with favour on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty. He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy, according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants for ever.'

Sermon by Revd Sarah du Boulay at Friston 15th December

Some sermons are easy to write in plenty of time before a service, others take a little longer. This one was written after the Strictly Come Dancing final last night! I knew what I needed to say, but didn't know how to say it, and God Bless Strictly – it gave me what I needed.

It was a beautiful final, and I spent a lot of time in tears. It was joyful, it was supportive, it was positive, it was emotional, it was brilliant telly! I really enjoyed all four finalists, and fully engaged with their journeys from week one to the final, but my favourite was always Chris McCausland. For those of you who don't know, Chris McCausland is a comedian and former children's television presenter. He regularly appears on radio and television, from silly gameshows to Have I Got News For You. He is also blind.

He was never the best dancer on the series. He had big problems with his posture because he has spent so much of his life hunched over, in his 'safe'

space, so his technique was not as good as the other finalists. He was also on a backfoot from the start because his professional partner Dianne couldn't show him anything. He had never seen the show and had no idea what the different types of dance were or looked like, or what he was expected to recreate. All Dianne could do was describe the dance and steps, and physically place his body in the positions required of him.

And he battled on. He took the notes from the judges and he made it to the final – I'm not going to tell you who won just in case you haven't seen it yet!

However, several times during the final, Chris was called an inspiration and a role model, and I think this is true. He was incredible and his partner – his teacher and professional dance partner was incredible. What really made me emotional though was the relationship between them and the faith she had in him. Dianne clearly believed in Chris and made the impossible possible. She advocated for him, she prepared him, she supported him, she showed him off and she helped him to grow throughout the series.

In this week in which we remember and celebrate John the Baptist, it occurred to me that we are called to be like Dianne. We are called to prepare the way for Jesus. We are called to have great faith, utter belief. Called to explain, to teach, to be joyful, to have a close relationship, to journey. To take the words of St Paul – to boast in Jesus Christ.

This doesn't always look glamorous and polished and television ready with perfect make up and clever dance routines. Much, much more time is spent in the blood, sweat and tears or the rehearsal room. In our Gospel reading, John starts by saying 'you brood of vipers!' and goes on to tell people exactly what they are doing wrong and how they can improve. He tells them clearly what is expected of them and what is needed for when they come face to face with God himself. He very clearly points the way to Jesus (if you will allow me, like every good professional dance partner, allowing the celebrity to be the main event). And he continually proclaims the good news to the people.

Even after 20 years, Strictly still becomes a national pastime. If you don't watch it yourself, I'll bet you know somebody who does. And people to watch it love it and talk about it and get excited about it and vote for their favourite and cry when something beautiful happens... Millions of people tune in every week to watch. In the 2023 statistics, fewer than I million people attend church every week.

Can you imagine if we all spoke about God with the same emotion and passion as we speak about Strictly? Can you imagine if the CofE weekly attendance increased by nearly 10 times to make it level with Strictly figures?

I have taken a few liberties with my comparisons this week, I realise, but this is what I take every year from remembering John the Baptist. Reading about him makes me dream a little bigger. Makes me imagine more clearly what it will be like when God's kingdom is fully realised. Although my tree went up weeks ago, this is the week when I always start to feel 'Christmassy'; when it really comes home to me what we are preparing for in Advent.

From a place of love and joy and belief, to faithfully prepare the way for Christ, our Creator and our Redeemer. To speak and live out the Good News in an emotional, impassioned and excited way. To share this with as many people as possible. To live as though we believe this with all our hearts and to be 100% 'in'. And for the whole year, not just at Christmas-time, to 'Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice.'

Post Communion

Heavenly Father, who chose the Blessed Virgin Mary to be the mother of the promised saviour: fill us your servants with your grace, that in all things we may embrace your holy will and with her rejoice in your salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Collect

Eternal God, who made this most holy night to shine with the brightness of your one true light: bring us, who have known the revelation of that light on earth, to see the radiance of your heavenly glory; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Isaiah 52.7-10

How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news, who announces salvation, who says to Zion, 'Your God reigns.' Listen! Your sentinels lift up their voices, together they sing for joy; for in plain sight they see the return of the Lord to Zion. Break forth together into singing, you ruins of Jerusalem; for the Lord has comforted his people, he has redeemed Jerusalem. The Lord has bared his holy arm before the eyes of all the nations; and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God.

Second Reading Hebrews 1.1-4 5-12

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs. For to which of the angels did God ever say, 'You are my Son; today I have begotten you'? Or again, 'I will be his

Father, and he will be my Son'? And again, when he brings the firstborn into the world, he says, 'Let all God's angels worship him.' Of the angels he says, 'He makes his angels winds, and his servants flames of fire.' But of the Son he says, 'Your throne, O God, is for ever and ever, and the righteous sceptre is the sceptre of your kingdom. You have loved righteousness and hated wickedness; therefore God, your God, has anointed you with the oil of gladness beyond your companions.' And, 'In the beginning, Lord, you founded the earth, and the heavens are the work of your hands; they will perish, but you remain; they will all wear out like clothing; like a cloak you will roll them up, and like clothing they will be changed. But you are the same, and your years will never end.'

Gospel Reading John 1.1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

God our Father, in this night you have made known to us again the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ: confirm our faith and fix our eyes on him until the day dawns and Christ the Morning Star rises in our hearts. To him be glory both now and for ever.

Collect

Almighty God, who wonderfully created us in your own image and yet more wonderfully restored us through your Son Jesus Christ: grant that, as he came to share in our humanity, so we may share the life of his divinity; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading I Samuel 2.18-20, 26

Samuel was ministering before the Lord, a boy wearing a linen ephod. His mother used to make for him a little robe and take it to him each year, when she went up with her husband to offer the yearly sacrifice. Then Eli would bless Elkanah and his wife, and say, 'May the Lord repay you with children by this woman for the gift that she made to the Lord'; and then they would return to their home. Now the boy Samuel continued to grow both in stature and in favour with the Lord and with the people.

Second Readings Colossians 3.12-17

As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Gospel Reading Luke 2.41-end

Now every year his parents went to lerusalem for the festival of the Passover. And when he was twelve years old, they went up as usual for the festival. When the festival was ended and they started to return, the boy lesus stayed behind in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it. Assuming that he was in the group of travellers, they went a day's journey. Then they started to look for him among their relatives and friends. When they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem to search for him. After three days they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions. And all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers. When his parents saw him they were astonished; and his mother said to him, 'Child, why have you treated us like this? Look, your father and I have been searching for you in great anxiety.' He said to them, 'Why were you searching for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?' But they did not understand what he said to them. Then he went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them. His mother treasured all these things in her heart. And lesus increased in wisdom and in years, and in divine and human favour.

Post communion

Heavenly Father, whose blessed Son shared at Nazareth the life of an earthly home: help your Church to live as one family, united in love and obedience, and bring us all at last to our home in heaven; through Jesus Christ our Lord.


