Collect

O God, you know us to be set in the midst of so many and great dangers, that by reason of the frailty of our nature we cannot always stand upright: grant to us such strength and protection as may support us in all dangers and carry us through all temptations; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading

Isaiah 6.1-8 9-end

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said: 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory.' The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: 'Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!' Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: 'Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out.' Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!' And he said, 'Go and say to this people: "Keep listening, but do not comprehend; keep looking, but do not understand." Make the mind of this people dull, and stop their ears, and shut their eyes, so that they may not look with their eyes, and listen with their ears, and comprehend with their minds, and turn and be healed.' Then I said, 'How long, O Lord?' And he said: 'Until cities lie waste without inhabitant, and houses without people, and the land is utterly desolate; until the Lord sends everyone far away, and vast is the emptiness in the midst of the land. Even if a tenth part remains in it, it will be burned again, like a terebinth or an oak whose stump remains standing when it is felled.' The holy seed is its stump.

Second Reading

I Corinthians 15.1-11

Now I should remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you-unless you have come to believe in vain. For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the

scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to someone untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them-though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

Gospel Reading

Luke 5.1-11

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch.' Simon answered, 'Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signalled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!' For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were lames and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

Sermon by Revd Mary Brown at Aldringham and Knodishall, 2nd February

Over the last few years Candlemas has become one of my favourite moments in the church calendar. I love that it is a chance to celebrate in the middle of what I think are the hardest two months of winter. I love that it focuses on Christ being our light. I love that it gives me a good reason to keep my tree up for 40 days after Christmas. And I love that it is an excuse to eat buckwheat pancakes, or Galettes Breton, (a traditional Candlemas food) because they are delicious!

Traditionally, the Candlemas service would have taken place in the dark, and it would have begun with a procession. Everyone in the village would take the lit candles from their Christmas trees and carry them to the church. It must have been a beautiful sight, I love the idea of the darkness of winter being interrupted, by a stream of light as the whole village poured out of their homes holding their candles.

In the temple Simeon told Mary and Joseph that Jesus is this **light that** interrupts the darkness.

This is a theme we are already familiar with. In Advent and over Christmas we heard this from Isaiah: 'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned.' And this from John 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.'

I've recently watched the second season of the program 'Rings of Power' a Tolkien adaptation that tells some of the stories prior to the Hobbit. I've been struck by how Tolkien focused on the theme of light overcoming darkness throughout his works. Again and again a force of evil is pushed back by light, often physical light. At one point in the adaptation one character says to another 'after all it is not strength that defeats darkness, but light.'

So here, in the depths of winter, let's think about the ways in which Jesus' light dispels the darkness.

We'll start with Malachi, who tells us that 'the Lord who we seek will suddenly come to his temple'. He tells us that when the Lord appears he will bring **the light of refining fire** - making those who have turned away from him righteous again. He tells us that when he appears the Lord will bring the **light of justice**, ending the oppression of the poor, of

widows, of orphans, and of immigrants. The Lord's just light will defeat the darkness of witchcraft, adultery, and falsehood. Jesus comes in his light to burn up the dross of our sin and our rebellion against him, so that instead, in him, we can shine like burnished gold. As he says in Matthew 5 - in Christ **we** are the light of the world!

Then in our reading from Luke we heard about Jesus' arrival in the temple as prophesied by Malachi some 500 years earlier. Simeon and Anna had waited for so long, and suddenly the one they had been waiting for arrived.

When Simeon, drawn by the Holy Spirit to the temple, saw Jesus he declared that his eyes had seen God's salvation. Simeon looked at Jesus with the insight given to him by the Holy Spirit and saw Jesus' light. He declared that Jesus was a **light to give light to the gentiles**, to bring them out of darkness into the salvation of God's people, and that Jesus was glory for the people of Israel. Here was a radical message - that the Messiah, who had come to save Israel, **God's consolation** for whom Simeon had been waiting, was also bringing salvation to the whole of human kind. It is because of this radical light of Christ - **the light that lets us see Jesus for who he is** - that most of us are able to be here in the Body of Christ today.

And lastly, we met Anna, a woman of deep dedication to God, who never left the temple, but fasted and prayed day and night. Just like Simeon Anna was able to see the light shining out from Jesus, she knew that he was the light everyone had been waiting for for hundreds of years, and she told everyone she could.

In assembly last week I taught the children about Candlemas, and about Jesus being the light of the world. I took a few props with me, and I've decided to bring them again today.

- We've heard that Jesus is **the light of refining fire** I've got some matches, and I'm going to light the Easter candle to represent this.
- And **the light of justice** that reveals and ends the things which are done in darkness I've brought along my model of Southwold Lighthouse because in his justice Jesus keeps us off the rocks, like a lighthouse.
- We have heard that in Christ we are made to shine with his light he is the light that makes us see so I've brought along a rear bike light, a type of light that lets us be seen by others.

- Jesus is God's Consolation for humanity **the light that brings us comfort** I've got my childhood nightlight with me something used to comfort children in the dark.
- I'm going to add one more type of light, Jesus is **the light that** searches us out, and helps us to see clearly in the darkness of this world he is like this torch.

Simeon and Anna were two people who chose what the theologian Eugene Peterson called 'a long obedience in the same direction'. They committed their lives to God, to worshipping him, and to waiting to see his salvation plan unfold. And because of this they got to meet Jesus, to see his bright light casting out the darkness.

Today, let's ask Jesus to show us his light. To let us see with spiritual eyes like Simeon and Anna did. Perhaps there is something in our lives where we know we have not been walking in justice, let's ask Jesus to keep us off those rocks and lead us into harbour. Perhaps there is something in our lives that is painful and hard and we need Christ's consolation, let's ask him to lift us out of the darkness of suffering into the comfort of his light. Or perhaps you are yet to see Jesus how Simeon and Anna did, yet to understand just who he is, and you would like to ask him to search you out, to find you in the darkness and bring you into his light - into the light of knowing him to be the Messiah, the Saviour, the Son of God.

Post Communion

Go before us, Lord, in all we do with your most gracious favour, and guide us with your continual help, that in all our works begun, continued and ended in you, we may glorify your holy name, and finally by your mercy receive everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
