A message from Revd Mary Brown

This week the season of Lent began. Some of us from across the Benefice gathered at Knodishall Church for an Ash Wednesday Benefice service. During the Ash Wednesday liturgy we are reminded of our frailty, our mortality and our sin. We are reminded that without God's help we can do nothing good. And we are marked with a cross of ash whilst the priest says these words: 'remember that you are dust and to dust you will return, turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.' This is a somber moment, a moment for deep and honest reflection before God. And yet, it is also a moment of great joy as we remember that in Christ we have salvation and redemption. In Christ's death he took all the brokenness of the world, including our sin, onto himself. In Christ's resurrection he defeated death and reconciled all of creation to God. Held in the safety of the hope of Easter Sunday, Lent allows us to face our mortality, our sin, our dustiness, and come before God within humble honesty, to find his love in the most broken, tender and vulnerable parts of ourselves, and to open these parts to his healing power. I pray that we would enter together into this journey as a Benefice this Lenten season.

In the words of Kate Bowler, (a church historian whose podcast I enjoy): 'for the next 40 days we walk together on the downslope with God. And yes, Easter is coming. Hope will be realized. The lovely part is going to come true, but we're not going to skip ahead. This is the season that asks us to stop pretending we're holding it all together. It is a time to pause, to sit with what's fragile and unfinished, and let God meet us in the hardest parts of our lives.'

Collect

Almighty God, whose Son Jesus Christ fasted forty days in the wilderness, and was tempted as we are, yet without sin: give us grace to discipline ourselves in obedience to your Spirit; and, as you know our weakness, so may we know your power to save; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading Deuteronomy 26.1-11

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.' When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us, we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and

gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me.' You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

Second Reading Romans 10.8b-13

But what does it say? 'The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart' (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, 'No one who believes in him will be put to shame.' For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

Gospel Reading

Luke 4.1-13

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone." 'Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, 'To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him." 'Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written, "He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you", and "On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." 'Jesus answered him, 'It is said, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." 'When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.

Sermon by Revd Mary Brown at Aldringham & Knodishall, 2nd March

The transfiguration. Apparently it really matters. We know that it matters because it appears in all four gospels. The gospel writers each had their own slant, their own audience that they were writing for. Jesus did many many more things than could possibly have been written down in these four books that we have, so each writer chose a selection of all of these things. But each one includes this story of the transfiguration. And when all four gospels, even John, include the same story, we know it means that it really matters for us. The church calendar reflects how much the transfiguration matters as well, because on this Sunday, which is called the last Sunday before Lent, we always read the story of the transfiguration.

The lectionary, the readings that are set for the day, cycles through a three-year cycle: Matthew, then Mark, then Luke. Every year, no matter which gospel we are in, we have the transfiguration. This is year C, and we're in Luke, and here is his transfiguration account. Why do you think it matters so much? Why did it matter to the disciples at this point in their journey with Jesus? And why does it matter to us as we are about to enter into the season of Lent?

I think it matters because if we were to enter into Lent, if we were to walk with Jesus towards his death on the cross, not yet fully understanding who he is, then it would be a completely depressing time! We wouldn't know the glory we were walking towards. And I wonder if the disciples would have stayed with him till the end? And yes, they all left him at the end, on Good Friday, in the garden of Gesthemane, or Peter a little bit later. They did all leave him. So even this glimpse of glory wasn't quite enough. But I wonder if this glimpse of glory kept them with him a bit longer.

Jesus needed them to know who he was, so that they would understand his teaching, so three disciples, Peter, James and John, get this experience. They get to see Jesus as He truly is. And we, with the advantage of having the gospel accounts written for us, get to read about it, so that when we arrive at Good Friday, we know that that isn't everything, that isn't the end.

The transfiguration helps us to believe in the resurrection on Easter Sunday. That is evident in the way that these three disciples, who became apostles, write about their experience on this mountain top. I'm going to read you a couple of extra scriptures that we haven't have this morning, because both Peter and John, in the bits of the New Testament that they wrote, refer to this as one of the lynch pins of their faith, that keeps them believing.

Peter wrote two letters in the New Testament and this comes from the beginning of his second letter. He says, very similarly to what we have just heard from Paul, "We did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and comings of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were eye witnesses to his majesty. For when he received honour and glory from God the Father and the voice was borne to him by the Majestic Glory, 'This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased'. We ourselves heard this very voice, borne from Heaven, for we were with him, on the holy mountain". For Peter, this experience of witnessing the transfiguration, is the evidence he uses for the truth of the gospel that he is preaching. He refers to God the Father as the Majestic Glory, and actually in the NRSV, this is capitalised, like a name The Majestic Glory comes as a cloud on that mountain top and says words that we are familiar with, as we have heard them already, earlier in our calendar year, at the baptism of Christ: "This is my beloved, with whom I am well pleased, listen to him".

So why does God's glory come as a cloud? To understand that we need a quick whistle stop tour through the whole of the Old Testament. So bear with me! The Hebrew word for glory is kavod and it also means weight. In the Old Testament, we see God's glory experienced as a physical weightiness. We see this in 2 Kings, when Samuel finally builds the temple to God, and they move the Ark of the Covenant into the temple, the whole temple fills with the glory of God. It says in Kings, and in Chronicles, that God's glory was so present that the priests couldn't stand up any more. They fell down on their faces. They had to stop and worship God, because of the weight of God's glory. It says " the cloud of God's glory filled the temple".

But that wasn't the first experience of God's glory coming in a cloud. God had been a pillar of cloud in the day, guiding the Israelites out of Egypt into the promised land. And then when they stopped, when they set up camp, they had a tent called the tabernacle, or the tent of meeting, which was like an early version of the temple, and the cloud settled on that tent. And a cloud on Mount Sinai. And that is what we heard about with Moses going in and meeting with God. So where it says "Whenever Moses had finished speaking with God his face shone", he's going into that cloud on the top of Mount Sinai. So this cloud in the transfiguration isn't a surprise to Peter, James and John. They know that the cloud on top of the mountain is God's glory. And they know that it is a dangerous place to be. It had been a great privilege for Moses to speak directly with God and live. His face shone so brightly that he had to cover it with a veil. This is an astounding glory. They knew what had happened to the priests in the temple, and they knew that even then in their day, whenever the high priests took their turn to go into the Holy of Holies, where God's presence dwelt, that they had to go in with a rope tied around their waist, in case, in seeing God's glory, they dropped dead, and had to be pulled out. That is why they are terrified. They are completely justified in being terrified. And yet, like Moses, they get the privilege of being with glory, and not dying.

I'm just going to read to you from the beginning of the gospel of John. Like Peter, John says that his faith is based on this encounter. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him was not anything made that was made. In Him was life, and the life was the light of men". You can hear that theme of light running throughout. "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness does not overcome it. The true light, which is light for everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made through Him, but the world did not know Him. He came to His own, and His own people did not receive Him. But to all who did receive Him, who believed in His name, He gave the right to become children of God. And the word became flesh, and dwelt among us". And actually that word "dwelt" here is the same word for tabernacle the tent of meeting. The word came as tabernacled among us. "And we have see His glory, glory as of the only Son of the Father, full of grace and truth". The we is John and all the other apostles, the ones who God has appointed to tell Jesus's story ongoingly, after His ascension. He says 'we've seen it, we've actually seen his glory - we were on top of that mountain, with him'

So what did they see on top of that mountain? Let's read a few of those words. "While he was praying his face shone and his clothes became dazzling white". That word for dazzling is actually the word for lightening, as white as a flash of lightening.

I have just been at Knodishall, leading BCP morning prayer. At BCP morning prayer you wear a cassock, which is the black long thing, with the white floaty thing, which is called a surplice, and a black scarf. I opened my vestments bag, and went "oh whoops, there's no white thing!" I had shut my surplice in the car door, driving from a funeral to the Greenwood burial site, and it had got rather nasty, and I had done my best to clean it

with brake cleaner but I hadn't quite managed it, and Dorothy, the expert producer of white linen had taken it home to clean it, which is why I didn't have it with me.

And I thought 'well of all the Sundays for this to happen, what a perfect illustration', because Dorothy makes very white linen, very white, but even that couldn't compare to this. Even Dorothy would be astounded by the whiteness of Jesus's clothes at this moment. His clothes were white like none of us has ever seen before. You can see that Luke is struggling for words trying to explain it. Mark and Matthew both say it was like encountering the sun. But they didn't mean like going out today and saying "the sun's nice, it's warming my face". They meant like coming face to face with the sun, that's how bright Jesus was. You see why they were terrified, they should have been burnt up. They shouldn't have been able to stand that close to a lightning strike and not die. And yet they were living, yet they were welcomed into that glory.

And then we get this voice - this cloud, that over shadowed them, and the voice that said "this is my Son, my chosen one, listen to him". And what had lesus been telling them? What had they not been listening to? He'd been telling them that he was going to die. In the reading from Luke, verse 31, Moses and Elijah were talking to Jesus about his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. That's referring to his death. Peter had actually said "No Lord, that's not going to happen! I am going to defend you, you will not be allowed to be killed". And this is God saying "listen to Him, it is going to happen, it matters, and it's important. And here, as you don't seem willing to believe, I'll show you who he really is". Last week we talked about who is Jesus, we talked about it the week before as well, and, here in the transfiguration, that's what we get to see. Jesus is God, he is the Son of God, he is the Word, which is what John calls him, he was with God in the beginning, and was God in the beginning. But, miraculously, he is also human, he is both the human son of Mary, and the divine Son of God. His glory is hidden in his human body, and most of the time, when he was walking on earth, people didn't see it fully. They saw glimpses of it, when he did miracles, when he turned the water into wine, when he stilled the storm, when he healed people, when he cast out demons, they saw glimpses of his glory, but they didn't see him as he truly was, until this mountain top moment. Until that veil was taken away like the veil that had been over Moses's face, and he was seen as he truly was, in all his glory.

That is what Peter and John tell us, that we should hold onto as a reminder that this is all true. I just said like Moses, and his veil being taken off, but there is a key difference. Moses was reflecting God's glory, like the moon reflects the sun. Jesus is the sun, he was shining with his own glory. And the really astounding thing if you weren't already astounded, let's guickly look at what Paul says. Because what Paul tells us, is we're not going to be like Moses, reflecting Jesus's light, we are going to be like Jesus, shining with God's glory from inside us. We are going to be like little suns. That's amazing. He says it here "And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the Glory of the Lord, as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed (this is the same word Luke uses for transfigured, is the Greek word metamorphosis, that we use to talk about a caterpillar turning into a butterfly) we are all being metamorphosed into the same image from one degree of glory to another, for this comes from the Lord". So he talks about a mirror, and why? Because we look in a mirror and see ourselves, but as we walk with lesus, as we give our lives to him, and commit to walking in step with him, walking in step with the Holy Spirit, each time we look in the mirror, we'll look a little bit more like lesus, because we are being transformed. Jesus's transfiguration moment was immediate, because he was already glorious, he was lifting the veil and showing them. Our transfiguration takes a lifetime. But it will happen, if we put our trust in lesus.

So what are we meant to do about this? I have a couple of questions to leave you with. Have you seen the glory of the Lord? Do you want to see the glory of the Lord? Will you listen as God says "this is my Son, my chosen, listen to him"? At Alpha, we've been talking about what the word Christian means. It was originally developed as a religious slur, a term of offence that the non-Christians in the Roman Empire used against Christians. It means Little Christ. So you can imagine them saying "oh you're just a little Christ". And the Christians said "no, that's not offensive, it's a massive compliment. I'll be a little Christ". And they claimed that word for themselves. And that is exactly what Paul is telling us, that through the work of the Holy Spirit, inside us, we become little Christs, we become just like Jesus. What an amazing thing.


BISHOPS' LENT APPEAL 2025
